

## **Granby Textile Recovery Locations**

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP), the Secondary Materials and Recycled Textiles Association (SMART), and the Council for Textile Recycling (CTR) have joined forces to encourage Massachusetts residents to drop-off unwanted clothing, footwear, linens and other textile products at collection containers or charitable organizations. **95% of all textiles are reusable or recyclable**.

## Acceptable textile items for reuse and recycling include:

- clean and dry used clothing
- all footwear
- accessories such as hats, gloves, scarves, handbags, duffle bags, totes, belts, and ties
- linens such as sheets, blankets, comforters, dishtowels, throw rugs, drapery, table linens, and placemats
- stuffed animals and pillows.

## Textile bins can be found at the following locations in Granby. All locations can be found on Route 202.

Companies collecting textiles in town include: Salvation Army, Kiducation (takes books too); Planet Aid; Rock Solid Charity; and, AFAB Recycling.

## **Facts about Textile Recovery & Disposal**

In an era of cheap clothing, **textile waste now accounts for 6% of all solid waste going into landfills** and incinerators. According to an analysis of statewide waste composition, approximately 230,000 tons of usable clothing, footwear, linens and other textile products are thrown away annually in the state of Massachusetts.

Almost 95% of all used clothing, footwear, sheets, towels, curtains, pillows and stuffed animals can be reused or recycled.

- EPA reports that of the 17 million tons or 38 billion pounds of textiles discarded by American households each year
- Only 15% or 2.3 million tons are recovered for reuse and recycling.
- Diverting textiles from the waste stream can significantly **reduce green house gas emissions**. Nationwide recycling of 2.3 million tons of clothing each year is equivalent to removing 1.3 million cars annually from the nation's highways.

When you donate textiles at local school fundraising events or put them in textile bins located throughout your community, **95% of the textile products are either reused or recycled**.

- About 45% of the textiles are reused and sold as second hand apparel, either through charitable organizations such as the Salvation Army and Goodwill Industries; or by for-profit exporters that sell baled clothing to developing countries.
- About **30% of donated textiles are converted to industrial wiping cloths** for use primarily in the automotive and public works industries.
- 20% of the donated textiles are sent to fiber conversion companies where textiles are broken down into their basic fiber components to be remanufactured into insulation for automobiles and homes, or used in the manufacture of carpet padding and sound-proofing material.
- Only 5% of donated textiles end up in landfills or incinerators, either because the textile is wet and mildewed, or stained with a hazardous solvent such as gasoline.
